HOOPOE SHARE - SUMMARY

Since our previous report (see <u>June 2025</u>), we have made good progress, greatly expanding the number of languages we have available and adding to the wealth of material we have to offer, across all medias.

Donations have allowed us to complete Phase One of our strategic plan, and we now have over 1,000 "artefacts" available in our online Hoopoe Share library (https://www.hoopoeshare.org).

Our material centers around 32 stories in various forms, including read-online, animation, audio, live readings, and animated with on-screen subtitles. We have also produced teacher and parent support materials for these titles, in several new languages.

Since our last report, we have signed more paying subscribers, thanks to our volunteer-ambassadors and two new sales ambassadors.

Meanwhile, we continue to stock our virtual library shelves and put the finishing touches to new titles, such as *Hannah and the Animals* and *Alice and the Goblin*, both of which feature female leads. We are directing our work on raising the profile of Hoopoe and the unique materials we have to offer.


AMBASSADORS

NEW ILLUSTRATIONS

Since its foundation back in the 1990's, Hoopoe Books has prided itself on offering children the highest quality text and artwork imaginable, irrespective of their circumstances. To this day, we push our illustrators to pull out all the stops, explaining to them that their artwork

will often end up in remotest locations, as quite literally the only quality, printed artwork a child and their family will have ever seen, let alone owned.

It is then enormously humbling to witness time and time again the extra effort these illustrators put into providing us with such characterful and complex work.

The standard is simply breathtaking. And our latest books are testaments to this. Hot off the press for this report are Croatian illustrator

Cella Anita Celić's enchanting watercolor artwork for After A Swim.








AFGHANISTAN UPDATE

As many will know, in September and October, Afghanistan's Taliban government implemented internet shutdowns, citing the prevention of "immorality" and "vices." The interruption was intensely inconvenient for the population, hitting the healthcare system, banks, NGOs, and government services like passport and ID card applications hard.

But for women and girls, who are already banned from traditional schooling, it was catastrophic. Hoopoe Share's online library, which includes a great many titles in Dari and Pashto formed part of the vital online educational resource, so heavily relied upon by these female students.

When all communications across the country, including all internet and phone service, went down without warning, we at HSLF joined a great many non-profits scrabbling to work out how best to continue helping Afghans. Working with trusted partners, we immediately provided all the printed bilingual editions we had in stock for distribution to Eastern Afghanistan.

Hoopoe's list of 12 original titles (including *The Silly Chicken, The Lion Who Saw Himself in the Water, Neem the Half Boy, Fatima the Spinner* and *The Man with Bad Manners*) were swiftly loaded on trucks and guietly distributed.

We are very relieved to see that the internet is again technically available in most urban areas, although remains costly for many and is deeply unreliable.

WORLD TALES CULTURAL STORY BANK

Anyone visiting Hoopoe Share's library will soon see *World Tales* joining the 32 teaching-stories we already provide. These traditional tales, submitted by readers from around the world, hail from very different communities, from Ethiopia to Peru. Stories like these offer us the opportunity to champion local storytelling and revel in the richness of the spoken and written word of other people and cultures. Long-time readers of Idries Shah will know that he was intensely interested in all stories (not just teaching-stories) seeing them as remarkable vehicles for thought, imagination, innovation, and cross-cultural exchange.

At the time of this report, we have **43 wonderful "World Tales"** which we are having illustrated and laid out to add to our site. Here's a sample book page from **"The Animals Who Didn't Listen"** in the World Tales series:

The goat, thinking himself clever, was tethered by one horn

The sheep were sheared until their wool was gone.

And, the gentle vicuña, fastest of all, was trapped by a net, then forced into captivity.

At last, the sky darkened with a shadow, and the condor swept down from the high peaks, wings wider than a man's house. Circling majestically, he landed at the feet of the boy.

SONGS

Thanks to the incredibly talented and committed **Steve Grocott**, we now have 13 Hoopoe Songs recorded. Steve has tackled title after title for which we at the Hoopoe Office are eternally grateful. Not to mention that we are going around humming them ourselves. Early response from educators is that songs are an entertaining way to get story content to children, especially when they are otherwise occupied, such as moving desks in classrooms or getting ready for quiet time. It is often the case these days that teachers are working from rigid lesson plans, allowing no scope to introduce our material in any written form. By providing them with our stories as songs we offer the chance for them to simply press play.

INDIAN LANGUAGES

In other exciting news, we were delighted to announce that we are looking to move into translation of some key Indian languages. Languages we will focus on are Hindi (which has around 528 million first-language speakers), Bengali (with approximately 97 million native speakers) and Marathi (with around 83 million native speakers).

MOROCCAN SCHOOL UPDATE

You may remember that in our last report, we detailed a visit we'd made to a remote school in Morocco to raise funds for vital improvements. We have since revisited to check on developments with Hoopoe director, **Archie**O'Shaughnessy, providing this latest update.

In January this year, Hoopoe founder **Sally Mallam** and I as Hoopoe Director visited Ait Massoud's school, a couple of hours outside of Marrakech. The intensely rural school consists of 3 small classrooms and a toilet block down a dirt track, with some children needing to walk upwards of 5 km to get to class.

Parts of Morocco are still struggling from the effects of the 2023 Al Haouz earthquake that killed 3,000 people and left a further 5,500 injured. In Ait Massoud, the school sustained serious damage, making two of the classrooms unsafe for purpose, and putting the toilet block out of use.

Meanwhile, the school desks were on the verge of dangerous, there was no courtyard for the kids to play in safely and no surrounding walls and fencing to deter animals or uninvited visitors.

Thanks to some very generous donations, made just a matter of days after our initial visit, construction work began on improvements to the school immediately. In September, I re-visited the school to teach another creative workshop, this time to around 55 kids, and to see the renovations in person.

I'm incredibly happy to say that the school is completely transformed. We spent a few happy hours making hanging door decorations and being proudly shown around the transformed campus.

All three classrooms are back in action, there are new lights and desks in all rooms, a perimeter wall for security is in place, the beginning of an outdoor play area is laid, the toilets are up and running, and the whole school has been painted in weather-resistant paint.

It was lovely to recognize kids who I saw in January enjoying their new facilities and actively enjoying learning. None of this would have been possible without the work of the highly committed teachers and your generous donations.

Construction is now almost complete with hope for the playground to be finished very soon. We intend to send more books to Ait Massoud school soon and get them connected to the Hoopoe Share network as soon as we can.


